Other proposals that focus predominantly or exclusively on the United States are not eligible.”</p>	
<p>Application Components</p>	<p><i>Research Proposal</i></p>	<p>No more than ten pages. Times New Roman, 11-point font. At least one inch margins. Double-spaced.</p>
	<p><i>Bibliography</i></p>	<p>No more than two pages. Times New Roman, 11-point font. At least one inch margins. May be single-spaced. Must be in standard bibliographic format.</p>
	<p><i>Language Evaluation</i></p>	<p>Strongly suggested if not conducting research in English or native language(s).</p>

Application Components	<i>Cover Sheet</i>	Descriptive title beginning with “Doctoral Dissertation Research.”
	<i>Project Summary</i>	Must include three separate sections: Overview, Intellectual Merit, Broader Impacts.
	<i>Project Description</i>	Ten single-spaced pages with one-inch margins, in a font approved by the NSF PPAG. [See link in “Additional Resources” for more detailed information about content and sections.]
	<i>References Cited</i>	Only includes references cited. No page limits.
	<i>Biographical Sketches</i>	Submitted for both PI and Co-PI. Not exceeding two pages.
	<i>Budget and Budget Justification</i>	Food, lodging, transportation, and other direct costs.
	<i>Current and Pending Support</i>	Must be submitted for both PI and Co-PI.
	<i>Facilities, Equipment & Other Resources</i>	Lists resources that will be used to supplement award. If not applicable, must upload document stating “Not Applicable.”
	<i>Supplementary Documentation</i>	May include illustrations, maps, sample survey questions, or letter providing access to non-public site.

	<i>Resubmission Statement</i>	1,000-word limit.
	<i>Budget</i>	See link in "Additional Resources" for sample.
	<i>Bibliography</i>	Not exceeding ten pages in length. 10-point font. Single-spaced. 1-inch (2.5 cm) margins.
	<i>Curriculum Vitae</i>	For both applicant and supervisor. Not exceeding five pages. Single-spaced. 10-point font or larger. 1-inch (2.5 cm) margins.

Must be within seventh year of study during fellowship period. Fellowship can be for one semester or for an academic year.	
Application Components	<i>GSAS Online Application Form</i>	Through GSAS Fellowships Application Portal.
	<i>GSAS Transcript</i>	Official PDF transcript from the Registrar's office, ordered through SSOL/Parchment. May order a paper copy or print the official PDF and then scan and upload.
	<i>Curriculum Vitae</i>	Three pages maximum.
	<i>Language Preparation Statement</i>	Specify language(s) needed for research and proficiency in each. One page maximum.
	<i>Project Proposal</i>	No more than 1,500 words.
	<i>Timetable</i>	Two pages maximum.
	<i>Budget Proposal</i>	Two pages maximum.
	<i>Letters of Recommendation</i>	Two letters, one of which must be from dissertation sponsor.

<p>Eligibility Restrictions</p>	<p>Focus on ethical or religious values in all fields of humanities and social sciences. Must be in the writing stage of the dissertation. Must never have held a similar national award for the final year of dissertation writing. Must never have applied for the Charlotte W. Newcombe Doctoral Dissertation Fellowship before.</p>	
<p>Application Components</p>	<p><i>Online Application</i></p>	<p>Create account on application site and fill out required information.</p>
	<p><i>Supplemental Items</i></p>	<p>Doctoral transcript. Proposal document, including cover sheet, abstract, proposal, bibliography, timetable, and CV saved as a single PDF file. Must be correctly labelled and uploaded into Supplemental Items section of application.</p>
	<p><i>Letters of Recommendation</i></p>	<p>One must be from dissertation advisor.</p>

	<i>GSAS Transcript</i>	Official PDF transcript from the Registrar's office, ordered through SSOL/Parchment. May order a paper copy or print the official PDF and then scan and upload.
	<i>Curriculum Vitae</i>	Three pages maximum.
	<i>Project Proposal</i>	No more than 1,500 words. Margins not smaller than one inch and font not smaller than 10 points. Two-page limit for images.
	<i>Timetable</i>	Detailed timetable for completion of dissertation. Two pages maximum.
	<i>Letters of Recommendation</i>	Two letters, one of which must be from dissertation sponsor.
